Online AP registration begins on Tuesday

Newport students will **register online for AP exams this year**. Registration will take a few minutes and can be completed from any computer with internet access. Students should click the quick link on Newport's counseling center website or [visit this link](#).

Registration Information:

- Online Registration: January 16th – February 16th (Online Exam registration will begin on Tue, Jan 16, 2018 at 12:00 AM and end on Fri, Feb 16, 2018 at 11:59 PM).
- Scholarship deadline: February 16th
- Exam price: \$94 per exam (except Capstone Research which is \$142) Two options to pay: on-line through BSD or payment to the Accountant at Newport.

Families who may need **financial assistance with exam fees** will be able to indicate this during the registration process and will complete payment after the school has reviewed the scholarship request. Students need to come to the office and pick up a scholarship form and return it to the main office for approval.

We know that parents may prefer to register their students for exams. We strongly recommend that parents and students are both present while registering to ensure that the correct exams are ordered.

No more AP bubbling sessions! Students must answer all of the questions in order to complete the exam registration. Please answer all questions fully and accurately, as this information will be pre-printed on your AP answer sheet form and **will not be editable after it is printed**. A confirmation page at the end indicates that the exam registration process has been successfully completed.

Help Protect Your Teen's Well-Being with Purpose

Researchers at Claremont and UC Berkeley universities recently announced three exciting findings that can help protect your teen's physical and mental health. Unfortunately, only one in five high school students and one in three college students find this protective shield.

Speaking for the research group, Kendall Cotton Bronk, a professor of psychology at Claremont Graduate University, shared these three highlights of their work to understand how teens develop a purpose in life and how it impacts their well-being.

- Teens who find a sense of purpose to inspire their studies and their life will sleep better, suffer less chronic pain, and live longer. Teens who are guided by a purpose enjoy the psychological benefits of hope, happiness, and life satisfaction.
- While many teens struggle to identify a purpose, there are five clear steps families can take to guide young people toward a purpose that capitalizes on their strengths and values.
- The researchers launched a \$25,000 scholarship and a series of videos and interactive exercises in the Purpose Challenge, which incorporates cutting-edge science into inspiring teens and building college essays with their discoveries. (Read more about the [Purpose Challenge with this link.](#))

Families and mentors can use the following five empirically based approaches that help youth discover a personally meaningful direction in life:

Model Purpose—Surprisingly, adults rarely share with their teens what gives their lives purpose. They don't say what aspects of their lives inspire them to struggle through challenges. Talking about both your everyday motivations and aspirational goals helps teens begin to connect to the experiences in their own life that can point them toward meaning and purpose. Sharing the inspiration, not just the practical how-to instructions, directs teens' searches for their own guiding purposes.

Focus on Your Teen's Strengths and Values—Purpose emerges when youths apply their strengths—the abilities that come with relative ease and that they enjoy—to personally meaningful changes in the world. For example, a young person who cares about the environment and writes well may find purpose in environmental journalism.

Foster Gratitude—Acknowledging that it may seem counterintuitive to foster purpose by cultivating a grateful mindset, the researchers insist that it works. Helping teens reflect on the blessings and the people who blessed them, the team says, naturally inclines young people to consider how they want to give back. Simple, but frequent, inquiries of teens about what and who in their day that they appreciate is enough to set their minds to exploring what they value.

Encourage Students to Ask Those Who Know Them Well—Their limited experience can make it hard for teens to identify their strengths and even what inspires them. The adults in their life may have more insight. Encourage your teen to email or ask at least five adults who know them well these three questions:

- What do you think I'm particularly good at? What are my strengths?
- What do you think I really enjoy doing? When do you think I'm most engaged?
- How do you think I'll leave my mark on the world?

Remind your teen and the adults to consider all activities, not just academics. Parents can help further by encouraging friends and family to respond with first and strong impressions. Help your teen to use the responses as clues in their own deliberations, not expectations or final conclusions.

Focus on the Far Horizon—Day to day deadlines such as assignments, tests, and college applications capture our attention. Take time away from the daily focus for imagining what the future might look like if all went well. What will your teen be doing at 40? Who is in their life? Why? It is in the whys that students will find clues to their purpose.

Taking time for these simple steps to help your teen to think beyond job and career to what impact they want to have in the world can bring them both physical and mental well-being.

Get Insights on College Planning

Bellevue Schools will hold its annual college planning conference for families and students in early February. The event starts at 5:45 PM with a keynote speaker and wraps up at 8:30 PM after a series of short workshops. Parents and students can choose from dozens of workshops. The event can get freshmen thinking ahead and will help juniors get ready to wrap up an admissions offer next year.

Selecting a college and deciding how to pay for it has become a high-stakes financial decision. For the 2017-18 academic year, the average sticker price at private non-profit colleges (including tuition, fees and room and board) rose 3.5 percent to \$46,950, according to the College Board.

Much goes into college choice beyond financial consideration, such as a culture and environment fit for the student, availability of majors and extra-curricular programs, geographic location, and climate. Once your student has narrowed the list based on these and other criteria for a likely choice, you may find a new ranking pulls together in one table a number of comparison points. While the ranking is subjective, the presentation of data can spark conversation with your student about how to rank the institutions they consider.
