Tricks to Prep for Exams Next Week

With first semester exams on the horizon, I think a little refresher on student supports might be useful to families. Please share those you feel would support your student in the coming weeks-

- **Take care of themselves**--Sacrificing sleep, exercise, and proper meals will not improve your teen's memory or performance. Help them take quick breaks to see to their physical needs and then return to their studies fresh and ready. Make sure they eat breakfast. Hot breakfast is available every day at school using their District lunch account.
- **What Went Well**--Building confidence can help teens manage their stress. Asking "What Went Well" can help send them into tests feeling confident. It focuses them on their abilities and successes. Try these topics:
 - "What went well in this class all semester?"
 - "What went well in previous tests?"
 - "What went well when you have juggled various classes earlier this semester (or even before that)?"
 - "What went well when you were able to relax ...(fill in a time when they did a good job with stress)?"
- **Hit Pause**--Students can choose to stop and decide how they want to respond in stressful situations. It will take practice, but help them learn to take a moment to decide how they want to feel. Having a plan and remembering that they can choose is the first step toward gaining control.
- **Help with Perspective**--Young, stressed minds can get stuck on an imaginary path toward the worst-possible scenarios. Help them remember that this is one set of exams among many. Doing well can matter for college admission, but **so do a lot of other things**. Help them remember that there are many doors in their future. Encourage them to do their best through the exams, and then later, they can assess the many options that remain regardless of the test score. While it is possible that they will not end up exactly where they planned, it is highly likely that they will find their way.
- **Hugs Help**--The science is in: physical contact with someone who cares about you actually changes body chemistry. Hugs and pats on the back make a difference in how students feel and their stress levels. Some of our teens think they have outgrown hugs. See if you can get them to remember how good hugs feel. Even a squeeze of the shoulders or an arm can help.

Good luck to everyone. Our students have worked hard and prepared. History here at Newport tells us we can expect good outcomes next week.

Online AP registration begins on Tuesday

Newport students will **register online for AP exams this year**. Registration will take a few minutes and can be completed from any computer with internet access. Students should click the quick link on Newport's counseling center website or [visit this link](#).

Registration Information:

- Online Registration: January 16th – February 16th (Online Exam registration will begin on Tue, Jan 16, 2018 at 12:00 AM and end on Fri, Feb 16, 2018 at 11:59 PM).
- Scholarship deadline: February 16th
- Exam price: \$94 per exam (except Capstone Research which is \$142) Two options to pay: on-line through BSD or payment to the Accountant at Newport.

Families who may need **financial assistance with exam fees** will be able to indicate this during the registration process and will complete payment after the school has reviewed the scholarship request. Students need to come to the office and pick up a scholarship form and return it to the main office for approval.

We know that parents may prefer to register their students for exams. We strongly recommend that parents and students are both present while registering to ensure that the correct exams are ordered.

No more AP bubbling sessions! Students must answer all of the questions in order to complete the exam registration. Please answer all questions fully and accurately, as this information will be pre-printed on your AP answer sheet form and **will not be editable after it is printed**. A confirmation page at the end indicates that the exam registration process has been successfully completed.

Get Insights on College Planning

Bellevue Schools will hold its annual college planning conference for families and students in early February. The event starts at 5:45 PM with a keynote speaker and wraps up at 8:30 PM after a series of short workshops. Parents and students can choose from dozens of workshops. The event can get freshmen thinking ahead and will help juniors get ready to wrap up an admissions offer next year.

- Newport High School on Thursday, 2/8

Selecting a college and deciding how to pay for it has become a high-stakes financial decision. For the 2017-18 academic year, the average sticker price at private non-profit colleges (including tuition, fees and room and board) rose 3.5 percent to \$46,950, according to the College Board.

Much goes into college choice beyond financial consideration, such as a culture and environment fit for the student, availability of majors and extra-curricular programs, geographic location, and climate. Once your student has narrowed the list based on these and other criteria for a likely choice, you may find a new ranking pulls together in one table a number of comparison points. While the ranking is subjective, the presentation of data can spark conversation with your student about how to rank the institutions they consider.
